Beach Regeneration



ou may have seen that the ivv growth outside Siward has been removed and marram grass replanted. The area has been fenced off to allow

the grass to take. Similar work is in progress outside Earlslea where the extensive ivy there has been removed and will be replanted later this year. There has also been a fresh planting of marram grass outside East and West cottage at the bottom of Castwell Wynd. All replanting has been done by the students of Elmwood College under direction of Victoria Pendry and it has been done for

no cost other than a couple of boxes of chocolates. Lottery funding helped the work.





Phone Mast

ou may recall that for about 18 months we have been exercised with the location of a phone mast for the village. This mast is essential to improve the 4G coverage and eventually the introduction of 5G. If you are in doubt as to what this is all about do some research. Anyway an attempt was made to seek permission first to have it outside the Church. That did not go down well and subsequent discussions focused on an area alongside the 3rd fairway of the Baird course behind the telephone exchange. To our surprise this was vetoed by the planners and there then became a stand off between the planners and the proposers. Eventually thanks to the intervention of Councillor Bill Porteous a meeting was held recently with the Community Council, Elie Estates and the proposers and a site to the east of the railway bridge coming into the village from Leven was fixed upon and there is some hope that this site will be approved by the planning department. We have done a mock up of what it may look like and it will be partially obscured by the trees on the east side of the road.

"The Community Council has secured £25,000 CHARETTE from the Scottish Government's "Making Places"

Fund to undertake a Char(r)ette. A Char(r)ette is a consultation that involves getting the public and stakeholders together with a professional design team to generate a community vision for the future of a place. The process is endorsed by the Scottish Government as a way of ensuring local communities have a say in the future of their area. Fife Council have already expressed that they are keen to incorporate the output of the Char(r)ette. into the Community Place Plan for the town.

There are a lot of large scale developments affecting small towns in the East Neuk and we believe it's vital for local communities to be involved in the planning process. We welcome the opportunity to understand better what our villages need and ensure that any future projects or development are in the interests of the community. Elie and Earlsferry recently conducted a village-wide survey regarding the vision of the town. This received a high response rate with 374 surveys representative of 987 people completed. This shows that people are passionate and have a great interest in the future of our villages. The Community Council is very grateful for the engagement and encourages everyone to continue to be involved. It's only by people working together that we can move forward in the right direction.

The results from the survey will be factored into the upcoming Char(r)ette which is expected to take place over March and April. In addition to running a number of open workshops which people will be welcome and encouraged to attend, the consultation will look to engage with the school, church, local businesses, care home, sport and sailing clubs and all the various organisations and interest groups in the village."

Bank ATM

Planning applications and developments

Have you had a chance to look at the planning application for Chapel Green house? It involves complete demolition of the existing building and replacement with a modern edifice. This is the proposal looking from the beach reproduced as best as we can with Photoshop. It seems to provide for a swimming pool, double garage and extensive living accommodation on the whole site. The Community Council were divided on whether this was a development that should be questioned and ultimately the majority took the view that no objection should be voiced. But there are it seems many objections from the surrounding owners. This is an iconic site and its sky line is one of the most frequently photographed in the whole village. It will not be easy to accommodate a building of this size and extent to fit in with the traditional landscape. We are used to ostentatious use of buildings in this area and it seems a pity that there have been many similar type of angular and sharp-shaped contoured buildings allowed in the village. We remain to be convinced as to its suitability but perhaps more to the point - is this not one with which the community council as representing the community should at least have some involvement . Even more so since Historic Environment Scotland have voiced concerns about its suitability.

Prosecution



The owner of the area of ground to the south of Todburn at the top of Chapel Green and bordering Chapel Green Road, is being prosecuted for removing the trees from that area of ground. The removal of trees from a conservation area without consent of the local authority is an offence. The trial is set for April.



This problem rumbles on - the Health and Social Care partnership in Fife decided that the provision of three out of hours medical centres (i.e. post midnight) in Fife was uneconomic and they decided to close Glenrothes and - St. Andrews Hospital. This means that for any medical assistance required after midnight the patient has to travel to Ninewells in Dundee, Kirkcaldy or Dunfermline. The decision seemed to ignore the students of St. Andrews University and the demographic and road communications of this part of the world. Various attempts have been made to make the organisation review its decision. To date there has been to say the least a marked reluctance to do so but pressure is still being applied via the community council and a specialist Out of Hours group fighting to keep St. Andrews open. It seems that the partnership have at least agreed to look at the issue again but have indicated that they will use the same criteria to reach their decision which seems strange but whatever... The group put in a participation request. (Participation requests are a way for people to have their say about what improvements they would like to see made to public services they use. Community groups in Scotland have been able to make them since April 2017, when they were introduced as part of the Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act) but we think this is ground breaking in this part of the globe. The request has been granted which means that any further decisions have to be made in consultation with the Our of Hours Group However as the chair of the Fife Health Board says "it doesn't mean that the decision to close St. Andrews will be reversed " Nothing like being open to persuasion....




